
AN INVESTIGATION OF THE LIFE OF RONALD CHILDS THE VILLAGE COBBLER

Ronald James Childs was born in Ropley on the 10th January 1913. He died in 1992.

He worked and lived in Ropley as a shoemaker and a cobbler.


A cobbler is someone who mends boots and shoes

Ronald's Family and working life

We found Ronald and his family on Census records. Census records are important government lists about people and their personal information. For example – date of birth or place that they were born. A census happens every 10 years. You will all be on the 2021 census!

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Here in 1921, Ronald is just 8 years old



10 years later in 1921, the census shows Ronald, aged only 13 years old working as a boot repairer. He had left school as he had to work to earn money for this family.

When Ronald retired (stopped working), in 1978 aged 65, he was interviewed for the local newspaper. He talked about his work as a cobbler.

Footwear was much heavier in those days, he adds. Even schoolchildren—boys and girls—wore boots, usually with steel tips and studs. Very good for sliding when the ponds were iced over.


Most boots and shoes were handed down to younger children when they were grown out of.

"Many is the time my father and I worked well into the evening," he recalls. "Ropley, as an agricultural district, had lots of farm workers. They came to our shop after a day's work to have their boots repaired.

Most people only had one pair of shoes or boots. It was cheaper to mend boots than buy new ones.


